Investment trusts are quoted companies listed on the London Stock Exchange. Their share price is determined by factors including demand, or lack of, which means that the shares may trade below (at a discount to) or above (at a premium to) the underlying net asset value.

A trust's net asset value (NAV) is calculated as available shareholders' funds divided by the number of shares in issue, with shareholders' funds taken to be the net value of all the company's assets after deducting liabilities. In line with current industry best practice NAVs are shown that take into account the 'fair value' of debt. This means NAVs are calculated after allowing for the valuation of debt at fair value or current market price, rather than at final repayment value. NAVs with debt at market value provide a more realistic impact of the cost of debt, and thus a more realistic discount.

Trust aim & characteristics

The Trust's objective is to increase its total return above the benchmark index of 60% FTSE All-Share and 40% FT/S&P World Index (ex UK sterling adjusted) over the long term, by investing in UK and international securities. The strategy of the Trust is designed to meet the requirements of those seeking a single investment in a diversified and professionally managed portfolio.

^{††}The Trust also seeks to enhance returns for its shareholders through gearing, in the form of bank borrowings. Gearing can boost the Trust's returns when investments perform well, though losses can be magnified when investments do badly. Fund Managers' six-monthly review

Equity market returns for the six month period to the end of September were positive, as the Trust's composite benchmark returned 4.4%. The period started positively for global equity markets, fuelled by a better than expected earnings season and merger and acquisition speculation. However, the fall out from the US sub-prime mortgage crisis caused a period of heavy selling in July and early August, until interest rate cuts by the US Federal Reserve helped a recovery into September. The Trust performed very well as the returns in the period doubled the returns of the benchmark. Top performers in the period were BHP Billiton, as commodity prices and the demand for raw materials from the Emerging Markets remained high, and Nintendo as sales of the Wii and DS consoles continued to comfortably outperform their competition. Another top holding was Reuters, after it was bid for by Thomson. The worst performers in the period were Informa, Sthree and Minerva, which fell on concerns the credit deterioration would lead to a general economic slowdown.




